

Introduction

The following guide provides a basis for beginning electronic research on a wide variety of topics in music, including historical musicology, ethnomusicology, music theory, composition, and performance practice. It collects links to archival collections, online scores and sound recordings; article indexes, discographies and bibliographies; scholarly societies; musical reference works; and a miscellany of useful websites. Each entry includes a brief description of the resource, with tags for subjects and resource types. The guide is necessarily selective, and other important research resources are available only in printed form. As with most arts and humanities topics, it is important to investigate your research options across all formats.

Most of the resources in this guide are freely accessible to all users; resources that are available only to Harvard affiliates are flagged, and are also listed in the <u>E-Research@Harvard Libraries</u> portal. The database does not include links to individual ejournals available through the <u>HOLLIS Catalog</u> or the <u>Find E-Journals</u> section of the E-Research Portal.

The EVIA Digital Archive Project is a collaborative endeavor to create a digital archive of ethnographic field video for use by scholars and instructors. Funded since 2001 by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation with significant contributions from Indiana University and the University of Michigan, the Project has been developed through the joint efforts of ethnographic scholars, archivists, librarians, technologists, and legal experts. Beyond the primary mission of digitally preserving ethnographic field video, the EVIA Project has also invested significantly in the creation of software and systems for the annotation, discovery, playback, peer review, and scholarly publication of video and accompanying descriptions.

The language of this material is Persian, except where otherwise noted. A naqqāl is a solo vocalist. The men recorded here normally performed in tea houses of Mashhad or Bojnurd.

Heidari

Heidari is a naqqāl from Tehran [family's residence in Khiyābān, Mowlāvi, behind Bāgh-e Ferdows], who has been residing for the past three years in Mashhad and has taken a temporary wife. He is 62 years of age, and a member of the Nimatollāhi order. He has been active as a naqqāl for twenty-six years, and claims to have studied for twelve years under Ostād 'Asdollāh Yazdi. He uses a manuscript of the Shāhnāmah in the possession of his family "for seven generations." A conversation with Heidari is available on AWM RL 16251.







Archives and Research Centre for Ethnomusicology (A.R.C.E.)

A.R.C.E. is one of the most extensive audiovisual repositories of the oral traditions and performing arts of India. Housed in a state-of-the-art facility in New Delhi, it functions as a branch of the American Institute of Indian Studies of the University of Chicago, and is a member of a consortium of 52 major U.S. universities.

Established in 1982, A.R.C.E. serves as a repository for research tapes from South Asian and Western scholars. It collects commercial recordings and copies of recordings from collectors' private holdings. Drawn from 154 collections, these recordings range from classical music to folk and popular genres. Materials deposited in A.R.C.E. are cataloged and made accessible to interested scholars and institutions. Smithsonian Folkways offers the first opportunity for many of these recordings to be distributed around the world.

Among A.R.C.E.'s publications are the A.R.C.E. Newsletter; a volume entitled Texts, Tones and Tunes: A Multicultural Perspective; and The Music of Bharat Natyam, by Jon Higgins, A.R.C.E. also carries out research projects, such as the Ethnographic Atlas of Musical Traditions in Western Rajasthan, undertaken with the Rupayan Sansthan (Rajasthan Institute of Folklore), in Jodhpur. Dr. Shubha Chaudhuri, the director of A.R.C.E., is chief coordinator of the Archives Resource Community (A.R.C.), a network of 13 audiovisual archives in India.
